On May 17 our Treasurer, Eric Hellenmeyer will discuss **Spring Commissioning: Creating a Check List and Things You Can Probably Do Yourself.** Eric will talk about how he readies his and Cat's 36' *Seabird* for launch each year, and the basic chores you can do yourself, rather than pay the boat yard. RIGGING & EQUIPMENT

Do you have old sails in your basement or sails you know you'll never use again? You can give new life to an old sail and recycle it with **Sea Bags**. Through their Sail Trade Program, the process of donating a sail is easy. And for every usable sail, they offer customers a Sea Bags product in trade.

Go to seabags.com for all the details, but basically you contact them and describe your sail. They can arrange to pick up your sail or pay to have it shipped to them. Or you can drop it off at any of their retail stores. They have stores in Saugatuck, Harbor Springs, Charlevois, and Traverse City, Michigan.

Once they receive your sail, they evaluate the size and condition to determine the trade. They make each trade as advantageous to customers as possible and will even make your trade from the sail you've donated. Sail bags can be made to celebrate a wedding, birthday, or just your boat.

There is no sail that is too small or too far away. Sea Bags has reclaimed over 700 tons of sails since they started and in 2020, took in nearly 7,100 sails that would have otherwise gone to a landfill.

CYA

Following are highlights of the CYA March 24th meeting as reported by Jim Graham.

Ben Alden, representative of Westrec-Suntex (the two companies merged in February), reported:

- Harbors open May 1 and repairs from significant ice damage are now underway at Montrose and 31st Street, with Belmont, Diversey and other harbors to follow. He noted that Diversey Harbor's A, B and C docks need work.
- Smelt Season starts April 1, a sport seen mostly around Montrose Harbor. I believe it lasts through the end of April.
- Slips and moorings are still available at Diversey and 31st Street harbors, with a much more limited supply of space sizes available at Montrose, Belmont and Burnham.
- Lake levels are forecast to be down from last year.

Apple Margarita Mocktail with Tequila Option

Ingredients:

- 1 lime cut in half
- 2 Cups Sparkling Apple Juice
- 1 Cup Tequila (optional)
- 2 tsp finely rated lime rind
- 2 TBLsp Lime juice
- 4 cups ice cubes
- 4 slices green apple (garnish)

salt for glass rims

Run cut side of lime around glass rims and dip in salt to coat

Into blender place sparking apple juice, lime rind, lime juice, ice and tequila if using and blend until smooth

Pour into glasses and garnish with apple slices I like to make ahead and throw in the freezer to use when ready.

The Smokey Saltire, a classic cocktail with equal parts to be enjoyed dockside.

- 1 Oz Amaro
- 1 Oz Aperol
- 1 Oz Mezcal
- 1 Oz fresh lemon juice

Pour all ingredients over ice and shake for 1 minute. Strain into a cocktail glass and garnish with a lemon slice. Slainte!

When I think of boating and wine, I think of summer and white wines. Unless I am eating beef. That calls for a red where you can't see thru the glass.

I like some Sauvignon Blancs but you have to be careful. I don't like the New Zealand ones. I prefer Napa or Sonoma brands. Girard, Honig are a few. Another very interesting Sauvignon Blanc comes from France. Couldn't name a label but anything from Sancerre is good and very distinctive. A Sauvignon Blanc from Chile that tastes like a Sancerre is EQ Coastal. Less than \$15.00 at Binny's.

I also prefer white wines from Southern France or Italy. Dry, dry, dry. White wines from Languedoc, Cote du Rhone or Roussillon use grapes we don't use much in the USA. White Grenache, Marsanne, Vermentino. Costco had one from Paul Mas last year. This Spring I got a bottle of Paul Mas Sur de France at the Sawyer Garden & Grocery store (right outside of New Buffalo) for \$9.99. Definitely worth it. A few good ones from Italy are Gavi and Falanghina.


The thing about a lot of these European whites is you get a better wine for less money. If you want really good reds or great chardonnays you have to spend a lot of money. The wines I have mentioned all go for less than \$15.00 per bottle. Some from any particular region might be more but you should be able to find them for that price. Costco is a great source. They tend to have "runs" of wine so if you find something you like, get a lot of it.

Another good, dry white from America is a Pinot Gris from the Willamette Valley in Oregon. Any one is good. Again, same price range.

My last thought is that also a good summer wine is a Rose. Again, Costco sells a Cotes de Provence in the summer for about \$8 that is just wonderful. Also, a good wine is a Rose of Pinot from Oregon.
