CYA

Reported by James GrahamHighlights from the Sept. 26 meeting of the Chicago Yachting Association:

The CYA's nominating committee has recommended that Catalina Fleet 21's own James Caldwell be its next commodore. James is the current ice commodore and is expected to be uncontested for the top leadership position.

All mariners are invited to attend the **Chicago Yachting Association's End-of-the-Season Celebration**, Sunday, Oct. 20, 2024, 3-6 p.m., Chicago Yacht Club Belmont Station, 300 W. Belmont Ave., Chicago. Tickets are \$65/person, dress is "yachting casual," and each attendee gets a buffet dinner, one drink ticket and live entertainment. The event recognizes Boat of the Year, Sea Scout of the Year, Yacht Person of the Year and Venetian Night Winners for 2024. RSVP to Capt. James Caldwell, email jcald25994@aol.com. The Chicago Harbor report by Scott Stevenson:

- Crime problems at 31st Street Harbor were serious during early-summer, but the situation has improved since July. Two steps taken that have helped: (1) a parking garage was closed to the public and reserved for boaters only, and (2) new fencing was installed.
- CYA was asked to help select a date for next year's Venetian Night, but the options were extremely limited. No decision yet on a date
- A boating enthusiast, Marlon Everett, will be joining the Chicago Park District Board of Commissioners.
- The management company has sought to enforce a zero-tolerance policy for violent or criminal action, with threat of boating permit revocation. He noted that loud music is not considered a violation subject to expulsion from the harbor; that offense is handled by fines.
- There were 363 charter boats in the Chicago harbors this year, 175 of them at 31st Street Harbor.
- The National Sailing Hall of Fame will hold its induction ceremony in Chicago this year on Oct. 4-5, Chicago Yacht Club, 400 E. Monroe, Chicago. For more information, visit https://thesailingmuseum.org/events/induction-2024/ (Note that your CYA representative has been attempting to get John F. Kennedy, captain of the Victura, named to this Hall of Fame, but has been unsuccessful.)

RIGGING & EQUIPMENT

Fuel Filter Maintenance Submitted by Leo Beer

A fuel injection pump is a precise piece of equipment that can be disabled by even the most microscopic pieces of dirt or traces of water. It's also the single most expensive component of the engine that is serviceable by only trained and expensive technicians. Therefore, it is vital to be fanatical about keeping the fuel clean. Approximately 90% of diesel engine problems result from contaminated fuel.

Diesel fuel not only makes the engine run but also acts as a lubricant for the injector system. Fuel can be contaminated by dirt, water and bacteria. Even minute particles can lead to plugged or seized injectors, scoring of cylinders and plungers. Water contamination leads to loss of lubrication in the pump, misfires, loss of performance and a non-running engine.

During the extended periods of shutdown that our boats are subjected to up here in the colder climes, water can accumulate in fuel tanks from condensation on the fuel tank walls when less than full. Changes of temperature and humid air moving in and out of the tank vent causes water droplets to form in the tank. As the ambient temperature rises during the warmer months, bacteria and algae find ideal conditions to grow in a dark, quiet environment.

When you go out sailing, fuel sloshes around in your tank, stirring up contaminants that have accumulated over time. You try to start the engine, and it won't, or it has no power. The filter has become clogged.

Most diesel engine performance and no-start issues I've seen over the years are caused by captains neglecting to treat the filters as the most vital components of the motive operations.

I drain the water out of the water separator bowl twice a year and change the water separator filter and secondary engine fuel filter every other year even if I don't run the engine much.

Most all marina fuels have some types of additives. Ask when fueling what is added. If nothing, then adding a good anti-bacterial, anti-water and anti-gelling additive yourself is a great idea.

Lastly, whenever someone is having an engine problem and I ask them when was the last time the filters had been changed and I get the "I don't know" response, I just shake my head. CHANGE THE FILTERS as if your life depends on it. Your boat's engine does.


